

Alf was the instigator and founding president of our club, which was formed on 5th October 1988. It has grown from its original base at the Ferntree Gully Technical School to what is now our machine room at Glenfern road. The

On Workshop & Safety Matters

If you have been using the battery drills lately, you will notice that they have been not good. They have now been replaced with two new 14.6v drills. Cost \$165 each

How to save power tool batteries

- Never stick a warm battery in a charger this will shorten the life of the battery considerably.
- Never leave a charged battery in your tools for long periods of time.
- Never completely discharge a battery the proper time to remove the battery is as soon as the tool's performance begins to drop.
- Never repeat recharging after short usage as the battery creates a "memory effect" which shortens its life.

TIPS TO LOOK AFTER YOUR HUSBAND

(An extract from a 1950 Home Economics book)

Have dinner ready. Plan ahead, even the night before to have a delicious meal on time. This is to let him know that you have been thinking about him and are concerned about his needs. Most men are hungry when they come home and the prospects of a good meal are part of the warm welcome

needed.

Prepare yourself:

Take 15 minutes to rest so you will be refreshed when he arrives. Touch up your make up, put a ribbon in your hair and be fresh looking.

He has just been with a lot of work weary people. Be a little gay and a little more interesting. His boring day may need a lift to clear away the clutter. Make one last trip through the main part of the house before your husband arrives, gathering up schoolbooks, papers and toys etc. Then run the dust cloth over the table. Your husband will feel he has reached a haven of rest and order and it will give him a lift too.

Prepare the children:

Take a few seconds to wash the children's hands and faces (if they are small), comb their hair and if necessary change their cloths. Try to encourage the children to be quiet. Be happy to see him. greet him with a warm smile and be glad to see him.

Some don'ts:

Make him comfortable:

Have him lean back on a chair or suggest he lie down in the bedroom. Have a cool or warm drink ready for him. Arrange his pillow and offer to take off his shoes. Speak in a low, soft, soothing and pleasant voice. Allow him to relax and unwind.

Listen to him:

You may have a dozen things to tell him but the moment of his arrival at home is not the time. Let him talk first.

Make the evening his:

Never complain if he does not take you out to dinner or to other places of entertainment. Instead, try to understand his world of strain and pressure – his need to be home and to relax.

The Goal:

Try and make your home a place of peace and order where your husband can renew himself in body and spirit.
