

<u>Camphor laurel</u> (Cinnamonum camphora)

Camphor laurel seeds were brought to Australia in 1822 and the plant was re-introduced in 1855 and widely distributed to horticulturists and botanical gardens etc around that time.

With the removal of the 'Big Scrub' (which was the largest area of uninterrupted rainforest on mainland Australia) and the establishment of farms, it was recommended by botanists as a good replacement tree for a number of reasons. It was used for wind breaks, containment of soil erosion and as an ornamental garden tree - hence many larger specimens can be seen today in school yards and older established public places.

Throughout the twentieth century, as a result of the decline of the dairy industry, Camphor laurel' s have been allowed to proliferate on disused pasture along the coastal hinterland of New South Wales and parts of Queensland. Camphor laurels were still recommended for planting up until the 60' s and 70' s when it was realised the were fast becoming a noxious plant in the same category as other introduced plants such as Lantana and Groundsel. As a result farmers now find themselves with a problem on their hands with the necessary removal of these trees, in particular where birds spread them along fencelines, also the seed is washed into and along the river systems.



The prevailing attitude of people on the land is to remove them by localised poisoning or felling and burning. The trees are also considered to be an obstruction to natural rainforest regeneration due to the fact that they inhibit expansion of native plant growth.

The Camphor growing in this area has extraordinary colour and grain and as a result there have been times in our recent history where we have exported timber to Asia and later reimported it as a finished product.

Being a native of Asia the tree has cultural significance to Asian peoples and has been used for centuries for scent, camphor oil, crystallised camphor blocks for use in religious ceremonies and for medicinal preparations. It is also considered a valuable timber for furniture and carvings.

The use of this timber locally is limited but many people are starting to realise its value for furniture. There are many fine craftsmen on the North Coast of NSW who make some of the highest quality furniture available from this otherwise unwanted tree.

It has been estimated that there is something like 250 000 M3 of millable Camphor on the North Coast of NSW. At current prices this represents a value of between 100 & 200 Million Dollars. Not bad for what some people call a weed!

WE WANT YOU TO BE A SAFE & HEALTHY WOODWORKER

Being a public liability cover, the club's policy covers you for "3 rd party injuries" – in other words, if you are injured by what others are doing near you– BUT ONLY IF **YOU** ARE WEARING APPROPRIATE PROTECTIVE GEAR.

The longer-term injuries to your wellbeing are from noise and dust so always wear your ear protectors and dust mask when appropriate.

The above sounds depressing, but we all know that woodworking is as safe as any other activity, if you just apply common sense!
