

Most of us take advantage of the Club's dust extraction system when we use any of the machines, but have you really thought about what happens to that wood waste when it leaves that piece of timber? "Why," I hear you say, "it goes into those big plastic bags on that big vacuum cleaner thingy in the sanding shed!"

Some members have to transfer that sawdust from the expensive custom-made bags to cheaper disposable plastic bags, which must then be placed with the other waste drums near the Clubroom door for later collection.

Empty the vacuum cleaner, tighten that loose screw, but if it is something that you don't feel competent to tackle, then REPORT IT TO THE KEYHOLDER so that it can be fixed.

And finally, the usual reminder.

- Scan all timber (new and old) with the metal detector before being passed through any of the Club's machines.
- Inspect all timber for non-metallic contaminants such as dirt or stones.
- If second-hand timber is dirty, then sand it clean before passing it through a machine.
- Remove all paint from timber at home.
- Do not leave keys in chucks it is an extremely dangerous practice.
