Four of the seven were for families, two for the club, (one being made entirely by made Joe Semenow), and one started by John Kilby, and of special mention, completed by joint effort and presented by Chris Geritzen to the Alfred Hospital. Our Chris is a bit of a dark as on two occasions his horses have taken first place at the Lilydale Show. We now have six horses in the process of being constructed, one the work of the President and the other Eric, the odd job man!!!!

With regard to the 'Garath' horses, it was with pleasure that the three were completed and presented. The first went to Bunnings, Nottingham, as a thank you for the timber donated to us over the year. It was raffled and the money was donated to a family to assist in the cost of the hospitalisation of their young son. Mrs Emptage was presented with a horse at her home on the Thursday before Christmas by our President and Hurtle Lupton following a conversation at the 'Be In It' judgment Sunday. Mrs Emptage expressed admiration for the rocking horses on display, casually mentioning the 'Garath' and that her two and a half year granddaughter undoubtedly would love one. It was indicated to her that she had just won one. It was presented with the inscription "To the Emptage family in Memory of the late John Emptage from his mates at KDWC, Christmas, 2013". I am advised that it was received with great delight by the family, particularly Katlin 2 ½ years and Aiden, a year old. Mrs Emptage when first spoken to, wondered whether room would be found in her son's home. She recently advised that as a result of their delight in receiving it now has a pride of place the living area of the home. Mention was made that the tribute on it, to John, made it a must.

The last one was that started by the late Billy Longden. Now Billy was the life and sole of every monthly meeting. His enthusiasm for selling raffle tickets at these meetings will never be surpassed. It was at one of the early meetings that I attended that he attempted to hand me the stubs in the raffle book. I sought to explain to him that he had sold all the tickets. He was not to be argued with. Not knowing him very well I sought the help of one the members and the matter was resolved. Just after the last Stringybark festival the writer happened to be sitting with him and Karen Button at the 'tea table'. Billy was seeking help from Karen in relation to making a 'Garath' that he had started several years back and wanted to complete. He had at the table, some cut out parts. Karen looked across seeking help. This resulted in Billy being taken into 'Joe's Stable' and the pieces he had with the relevant templates. It was discovered that he had four legs the same, partially cut out. A few other parts were missing and the head was not glued correctly. Billy stated that the horse was for his wife. In a number of the ensuing days together, the shortcomings were rectified and horse was assembled, stained, dressed and the stand made. Billy was not seen for a week or more during the latter part of the construction. It was then learned that he was in the Anglis Hospital and on a Tuesday, a week before his passing, he was visited. He was duly told him that his horse was finished and he had to eat up his untouched meal otherwise he would not be getting out of hospital. Billy expressed his appreciation and immediately added, "You know I made that horse". Following his passing a week later, Sheila Longden was contacted and advised that the club was in possession of a horse that he had made for her. She was somewhat surprised but stated that he did mention he was making a horse but it had been long coming. She had queried with him, who it was for, and was advised it was to be given away. When the horse was delivered she mentioned her involvement with the Cancer Council but would leave it to her daughters to decide just what to do with it. It has now been advised that her daughters wish it to be kept in the family. **The name of the horse is 'BillyLou'**. Apparently Billy's boat was called 'BilCan'. The writer is very touched.

Recollections of Michael when speaking with close members and friends like Bruce Powell and Tony Truett paint a clear picture of what a tremendously helpful, jovial and community spirited chap, he will always be remembered as being.

Prior to being welcomed into the Club in 2005, Michael had been President numerous times for the Triton Holmsglen Club, but soon found himself entrenched into the toy group and horse making group at KDWC. Here he demonstrated his abilities in making some 8-10 horses not just for family, but for Cabrini Hospital where he held a long term business connection as well as being a patient. One of his Doctor's won a raffle for a horse built by Michael, but dutifully allowed to to be re-drawn. Michael went on to build four beautiful horses for Cabrini.

Many members remember with fond affection and pride, the help they've received from advise and general hands-on assistance provided by Michael at Club activities, festivals and Group sessions like Toys/Horses.

Michael's wife Margaret and their family retain a wonderful legacy in Michael's hand-crafted horses, ridden with joy by the grandchildren, and no doubt his character and devotion lives on in his works.

Workshop Notes - "members helping members"
Magswitch Featherboards

Another terrific article by **Phil Spencer**. In this article, Phil has shared his methods again.

One of the most useful accessories I use in my workshop is the humble featherboard. In the past I have either made my own or used a commercially made one. They keep my work in place and allow me to keep my hands out of the way. I always found there were limitations using featherboards. They relied on the slot in the saw table to be fixed or had to be clamped down.

A few years ago I discovered the Magswitch featherboard. These things had industrial magnets fitted that could be turned on to hold, or turned off to release. These have allowed me to not only work safer, but they are also more convenient to use, instead of relying on the track in the table to clamp the featherboard. I can position the featherboard anywhere on the saw table and I can also position them on my jointer to hold work down and on my bandsaw when re-sawing wood.

The other advantage of the Magswitch system is the magnets can be purchased separately and fitted to that custom jig or fence you have made. They give you the opportunity to work more safely and also open up other opportunities.


PS. - Why doesn't 'Buick' rhyme with 'quick'?
