TIPS, TRAPS, and TRIVIA.

Finishes (Steve Ross)

Boiled linseed oil has been used as a finish for years. The modern penetrating oil finishes are easier to use and are more durable. They look very similar so in most cases you can substitute a modern penetrating oil finish.

If you want to apply a genuine linseed oil finish follow this old finishing adage:

Apply the oil once an hour for a day, Once a day for a week, Once a week for a year, Once a year for the rest of your life.

It takes a lot of coats of linseed oil to make a good finish. Apply the oil with a rag, let it soak into the wood for about half an hour then buff like mad with a clean rag.

Mitre Joints. (Alex Davis)

Do you have trouble making snug fitting mitre joints. With the help of a very simple jig you can make perfectly fitting

mitre joints. The secret is to carefully make the jig which is not difficult. Use a piece a 1/4" plywood about 6" by 12". Layout two lines at an exact right-angle (90 degrees) for fastening the 3/4" by 1 1/4" guide strips. Glue and nail the in place so they make a perfect 90 degree inside corner. Don't worry about the quality of fit of the mitre corner on the jib. It is of no importance because you will be running your band saw or scroll saw through it anyway. Any miss-cut mitre is corrected by making successive passes and shifting the pieces together after each pass until there are no longer any gaps remaining.

REPORT ON THE CARVING COURSE WITH JOHN KELLY.

The four-week carving course with expert carver, John Kelly, is now over and the ten of us who took part now feel we could tackle just about anything with chisels and a mallet.

The first session covered the basics necessities of learning how to get the tools sharp and the best methods of holding and using the chisels and mallet.

We started on two projects on the first day, the first was a traditional-style shell and the second, a pair of gum leaves with gum nuts.

The second week we completed two rosettes and started on a pair of scroll-and-leaf moldings (suitable for application to furniture).

The third session was taken up with completing the scrolls and starting an sculptured ducks.

A flower completed the list of projects set by John to cover most of the techniques and styles of carving.

While everybody's pieces all looked distinctively different, it was quite apparent that we had all enjoyed developing our own style and interpretation into each

carving.

The last session was interesting in that most of us had come prepared with a project of our own to get started on. Sue Wood has started an ambitious coat of arms, Gordon Hill made a delightful three-dimensional pig, Herman van der Breggan made a cute kookaburra, Paul Tresize worked on a floral motif for a mirror stand, John Doyle got stuck into some claw-and-ball legs, Martin Schueler worked on some incise carving, Thecla Wouts made a lovely scroll for her baby son, and I (Fiona Ross) worked on a carved scroll sign.

Those of us in the class are keen to maybe ask John to conduct a follow-up course and we would recommend the course to everybody. A big thanks to John Kelly for making our four May Saturdays so interesting, exciting, and rewarding.
