

TIPS, TRAPS AND TRIVIA

A handy gadget for checking whether a pedestal or bench drill table is perpendicular to the chuck is to use a piece of coathanger wire. Simply bend the wire into an elongated Z shape and stick one end into the chuck. The opposite end acts as a guide to show up any high spots on the table, when rotated. If the wire touches in spot and not another, simply adjust the table until the clearance is the same allothe way around.



Profile of the Month: BILL GILLINGHAM

I worried the local shop keepers for tea chests and sugar boxes. All my family and friends had samples of Bill's fretwork picture frames. Between the ages of 14 - 20 my hobby was a bit of a love hate affair, trying to fit it in with work and bicycle riding.

My twentieth birthday was a big surprise for me. I had a letter from H.M. inviting me on a tour of Europe, but forgot to tell me how long it was going to last. Well to ce\ut a long story short, I returned home six and a half years later to a wife and child.

On my return my first priority had to be a job. I got one in a builders yard, with a promise of being able to become a wood machinist. That job fell through as all they wanted was people to stack timber.

After a while I got a job in the water industry. I stayed for 34 years and I retired from it in 1980.

Although I've been interested in wood work most of my life, I've never mad a living at it. Maybe that is why I get so much pleasure from my hobby. I find it most satisfying.

Report on meeting - Wednesday 15 August, 1990.

The organisation and successful presentation at both the show and festival requires the commitment of most members and active participation in logistics and "manning" of the stands. For this purpose blank roster forms are circulated at this members meeting for:

Number One Volunteer Group

(4 members) to organise preparation of the display exhibition items such as collecting, labelling with stickers, cataloguing of items, packing transport, setting up of display, packing up after the show and returning items to owners. Also organising items for sale, custody of proceeds and returning cash and statement to our treasurer.

Number Two Volunteer Group (4 members)

Collecting and storage of display equipment (stands, machines, tables, light etc.) transport to and setting up shows. (Wednesday 17 October Working with Wood) (early Saturday 27 October Stringybark Festival).

Number Three Volunteer Group (4 members)

Packing up machines and stand equipment (installed by group number two) transport home, safe storage and return to owners. (Sunday night 21 October Working with Wood) (Sunday 28 October Stringybark)

Number Four Volunteer Groups (4 members)

For administration of Communications with show organisers, confirm bookings, payments/fee's, insurance cover, organising passes, stand manning rosters, co-ordinating volunteer groups one, two and three.

Options

Depending on the commitment and participation by members, which will be shown by the number of volunteers available, alternative options as seen by the committee area:

(a) Fully manned stands.

(b) Attend as static display - one, two persons in attendance.

(c) Forfeit deposit and abandon proposed show display.

(d) Attend stringy bark festival only.

Last year the burden of organising and doing all the work fell on the main committee and a few loyal members only.

As the main Committee works hard right through the year it is unfair to expect them to carry the burden of organising and running the shows as well on behalf of all the members.

So it is up to us before the night it is out to:

- (a) fill the thirty six time slots on the stand attendance roster and
- (b) to find four groups of four members each to:
- (1) organise the display.
- (2) organise the stand and transport etc.
- (3) packup and transport etc.
- (4) co-ordinate the administration.

There is also a list to indicate if you are unavailable to help with the show and or festival.

We know three members are interstate and/or overseas, which is a legitimate and acceptable excuse.

For you who missed the members meeting on 5 September and do wish to participate ring Herman on 720 2447 or before 18 September so that the organising committee may make its final recommendation to the main committee before the Annual General Members Meeting.
