BACK TO SCHOOL -

A small group of members who accepted the arranged visit, on 21st June, to Holmesglen College of TAFE were most courteously welcomed by Mr. Neil Rogers, Head of the Dept. of Furniture Manufacturing, We learned that the College, which was established in 1982 is the first educational institution in Australia to be awarded the International Quality Assurance Certificate and is a huge complex consisting of 7 separate but interconnected buildings and is designed to cater for the needs os 22,000 students. The Furniture Dept. is a large spacious area arranged to simulate industry conditions with efficiency of layout carefully planned. There was traditional, as well as state of the art, machinery on display, with attention paid to dust extraction and air conditioning, above the main area was an office housing the computers which controlled the various state of the art machines. AN EVENING WITH CATON WOODTURNING -

The 16 members who resisted the temptation to stay at home in the warm and watch the telly were rewarded with fascinating display of woodturning, accomplished with both speed and accuracy. Our host, Wally Rowan, Irish by birth, but long established in Australia has worked solely at Caton Woodturning, first as an apprentice, then progressing from Manager to sole owner of the business. The majority of his machines are automatic, but not state of the art. He found that there was so much time wasted while setting up the during his one experience of modern techniques that he resold the machine at a loss and still remains highly competitive. Following a viewing and description of the various automatic machines, Wal demonstrated his skills on an old but much treasured lathe. First he explained his method of sharpening his chisels, explaining that he uses only three, a wide bladed gouge, a medium bladed gouge and a parting tool. His method of sharpening his tools, which, he emphasised he found only necessary once per day, was an education to everyone present, Bruce Allen being particularly impressed. Wal then proceeded to carve an ornamental leg. The amount of wood which was carved away at each single pass was astounding and in hardly any time at all, a finished product was completed. Challenged to dulplicate this shape; he pencil marked the boundaries of each curve on the tool rest and them with no apparent loss of speed produced a duplicate of the original. We, who were witness to these events were certainly appreciative of Alf's efforts on our behalf and to Wal for donating time and ability to present a very instructive and worthwhile programme.
