Also thanks to Peter Sleeman for the Train-Bus trip to Warrnambool and the Maritime Museum and whales, well done Peter.






A note from the Editor

SHALLOW FLUTED GOUGE


Detail Grind

Profile angle 45 deg


Front View


DEEP FLUTED GOUGE


(The "O'Donnell Grind")

A gouge where the flute extends beyond a semi-circle.










Front angle 90 deg
