

On Workshop & Safety Matters

A visitor arrived at the club to see a Club member a couple of Saturdays ago. The person just glanced around and was appalled at the amount of sawdust lying around and could only think how easy it would be for the workshop to go up in flames!

There was an absolute mountain of sawdust behind the Radial Armesaw, and from the hole in the wall behind the saw, handful after handful of sawdust was removed. In fact it took three men over half an hour to remove all the dust from behind the saw.

As Club members we should be proud of the state of our workshop, but on this occasion, none of us were! Somehow some members seem to think that someone else will clean up after them (perhaps this happens at home??!!) The key holder is not there for that reason either (as it is at times assumed). Each member should not think that someone is going to use a machine after them so they don't need to clean up. We should assume that someone is NOT going to use it after us and so clean any mess up ourselves. Apart from being a fire hazard, a messy workshop is also dangerous to work in and could easily cause an accident.

SAFE HANDLING PROCEDURES for MDF

1. Background

Previous experience has shown that adverse health effects occur in certain individuals following the use of MDF (craftwood). These adverse health effects have manifested themselves in a number of different ways such as skin rashes, eye and throat irritations, headaches and nausea. The effected people have come in contact with dust generated from machined and sanded surfaces in workshop areas.

It has not been established if these adverse health effects occur as a result of exposure to the particular dust or the release of the formaldehyde gas from the unsealed MDF products.

Reference to the Materials Safety Data Sheet (MSDS) for MDF craft wood indicates that the principle exposure routes via the contact with dust, gas and vapours released from the material. These act as sensitisers in predisposed people causing irritation of the nose, throat, eyes and skin. This may result in the development of allergic dermatitis or asthma. These effects are of particular concern of people with upper respiratory tract or chest complaints and asthma sufferers.

It is recognised that inhalation of wood dust, both hardwood and softwood, may significantly increase the risk of nasal and paranasal cancers.

SAFE HANDLING GUIDELINES

These guidelines form a basis of the minimum safe handling procedures that people working with MDF products must satisfy in order to address the potential hazards identified and the recommendations of the associated MSDS.

- Use a substitute material in place of MDF whenever possible.
- Work with MDF should only be carried out in the areas equipped with a proper dust extraction system in the workshop.
- If it is necessary to work with the material in other areas, then others not involved should be away from the area
- 4. The area should be cleaned up before others return

- All projects from MDF should sealed are painted prior to being used, to prevent the release of formaldehyde gas.
- All people working with MDF products should be made aware of the possible health effects.
- Personal protective clothing including safety glasses and dust protection should be worn at all times.
- 8. Protective gear should not be stored in the work area.
- MDF dust should be disposed of immediatly after cleaning up.
