

## On Workshop & Safety Matters

The club has recently purchased a Heli-Grind sharpening system for the lathe tools. This is an excellent system for sharpening tools accurately and consistently and therefore achieving better results in finish.

There are a few tricks to using the Heli-Grind, so members are asked to see how it works before they try it themselves. There will be a list with the equipment of those who have been shown how to use it, please don't use it until you have been shown how. The Heli-Grind will be kept in the mobile lathe equipment cabinet.

Members are reminded that logs or round timber are banned from being cut on all of the clubs machinery. Recently it was noticed that the bench saw had been used to cut a branch along the grain, it is an unacceptable and dangerous practise. It appears to be carried out by the mysterious "Phantom" again!!!!!!

#### **Safety Committee**

In response to discussions at the April Meeting, a Safety Committee has been formed with Peter Sleeman as the Convenor. The initial brief of the group is to look at the safe use of equipment in the machine room. The equipment has been broken down into five areas with the bench and bandsaws being the first priority. It is planned that ALL members will undertake a safety a review on the five equipment areas in the machine room.

#### Stage 1 The Bench Saws

To be able to use the above equipment, ALL members will be required to undertake a safety review by the 1<sup>st</sup> June. Process

- Designated trainers will be available at the current opening times of the club except Saturdays.
- The club will be open on Thursday Evenings for Safety reviews only
- Each group will have up to 4 members, a booking list will be on the clubs notice board
- Members will be signed off after completing the review and the results noted on the clubs records.

It is proposed that Stage 2 will run from the 1<sup>st</sup> of June to the 1<sup>st</sup> July.

This is seen as an important part of the clubs development.

#### Woodies Tips

Shellac prevents glue squeeze-out problems
To prevent glue squeeze-out problems when assembling
drawers, simply finish the insides of the drawers before
assembly. Sand all of the inside drawer parts, and apply two or
three coats of shellac, carefully avoiding the surfaces that will
be glued. Later, when you assemble the drawers, any bead of
glue will pop right off after it has dried.
