



Sharpening a Scraper (Woodturning)


Sharpening a scraper is easy. The first thing you'll need to do is set the tool rest to match the bevel angle on the scraper, see detail below.



With the rest locked in

place, creating the burr is just a matter of setting the scraper flat on the rest and sliding the cutting edge along the edge of the wheel, see photo. As you grind the scraper, a burr forms along the top edge, see inset photo.

For curved edges, the technique is a little different. To avoid grinding a flat spot, you'll need to swing the handle to the side as you move the cutting edge across the edge of the wheel, see drawing.

Bandsaw Operation

In order to obtain the best results with the maximum of safety when operating this versatile machine, the following suggestions should be considered.

1. See that the floor around the machine is clear of scraps of wood or other obstacles that could cause the operator to stumble, resulting in a serious accident.

2. In addition to the above see that there are no restrictions to the right side, the front or the rear of the saw that could impede the feeding of the material to be cut.

3. Before turning on the saw, adjust the height of the upper guide so that it is approximately 12mm higher than the timber to be cut.

4. Never attempt to cut timber unless it lies flat on the table. Any work of a circular or odd shaped nature which will not sit flat on the saw table, must be supported by a jig or other device. The downward force of the moving saw blade may revolve the work into the saw and cause injury to the work piece, the saw and the operator.

5. When cutting, hold the material firmly and feed the work in at a moderate rate without undue pushing. Allow the machine to do the work.

6. Should the work being cut jamb, Do Not Pull The Work Back Towards You. Turn the machine off and gently wedge the saw cut open to release the blade, then start the cut from the beginning again. If jamming continues, it might be alleviated by inserting a wedge in the cut beyond the table. 7. Do not attempt to cut circles less than the minimum diameter recommended for the width of the blade being



used. When cutting either circles or curves, do not turn the work unless this action is accompanied by feed into the blade, otherwise the blade may be damaged beyond repair 8. Keep the hands clear of the running blade at all times, use a scrap of wood if it is necessary to sweep any waste from the table. Consider when possible, keeping the work on the table to the left of the saw blade so that waste is discarded to the right and off the machine.

9. When sawing to produce small components, set up a fence and use a push-stick.

10. When sawing long or wide material, seek assistance to hold the work steady.

11. If the bandsaw is used only on rare occasions, consideration may be given to releasing the blade tension when work is finished. However some indication should be placed on the machine to indicate that this has been done, otherwise it is likely that the next time the saw is used, it will be without re-tensioning.

When the saw is used frequently and/or by different operators, it is probably better to leave the machine set up ready to run. The only time the tension has been altered or adjusted on the writers present saw has been to change the blade. After 10 years of fairly constant usage, close inspection reveals no wear on the tyres or the tension spring.
