

#### Loans of club equipment & books etc

With more club equipment, books and videos being loaned out the committee wishes to re-clarify the rules for loans to make it fair for everyone.



Club Equipment – The loan period is **48 hours** and the item must be entered in and out of the loan book by the **keyholder** on duty at that time.

Books and videos – the loan period is **1 week** and the same procedure for booking in and out applies as for equipment.

## **Getting Tough on Dust**



If you don't have a dust collection system in your shop, now's a great time to start thinking about it. For many hobbyists and homeshop woodworkers, such systems seem like a luxury – the last tool to be bought. But more and more of us are

beginning to take dust seriously as is the woodworking industry.

The reason to be concerned is wood dust is related to many health hazards, including irritation of the eyes, nose, and throat; skin rashes; asthma; allergies; and chronic bronchitis or emphysema. It has even been linked to a rare form of nasal cancer. Estimates indicate that up to 13% of woodworkers develop dust-induced asthma. During their lifetimes, one third of all serious woodworkers experience some adverse health effects from contact with wood dust.

While shop vacuums are extremely popular among woodworkers, they may not be the best solution for systematic dust control. Firstly their capacities are generally much smaller than that of most large, stationary machines and secondly, their filters usually don't trap some of the micro-particles that can aggravate allergies and irritate the respiratory system. There's no doubt: for most shops, a complete dust collection system is necessary to protect your health. Author unknown
