

Our President, Paddy Mc Cann's, September report

I wish to report that we have lodged our Application with The Federal Government, Regional Partnerships Grant through the Programme Manager, Regional Programmes Division, Department of Transport and Regional Services, on Wednesday 1st August. After a four hour meeting and discussion with The Melbourne East Area Consultative Committee representatives (M.E.A.C.C.) on the 1st August, Hughie Gaynor and I compiled and completed all the relative information and back up documentation required for our application, for a \$65,700. Grant. Now we have a waiting period of up to 22 weeks before we find out if we have been successful. Hopefully with the assistance of Jason Wood M.P. for Latrobe we may obtain an earlier resolution. We have already had notification from Jason informing us that he had written to the Minister the Honourable Mark Vaile M.P. informing him of his support of our application. Our thanks to Jason for his support. We also thank Hughie Gaynor for his work, dedication and encouragement in getting our application lodged by 1st August.

Our 'Be In It' Competition and Open Day held on Sunday 19th August was again a successful function. Although the number of entrants and entries were down on last year, (2006-38 entrants with 104 entries, attendance 110) (2007 – 22 entrants with 78 entries, attendance 95.) - for those who attended and those who entered the competition it was a very enjoyable day. Our thanks to all entrants for their support, for although the quantity of entries was down the quality, variety and originality was there. Our thanks to our judges Cr. Karin Orpen, Cliff

Walsh and Vic Oberg. We thank you for your time, expertise and critique. We hope you enjoyed the Day. I must say a special thanks to Cr. Orpen who saved the day with her computer skills and enabled us to present our winners with their well earned Award Certificates, after we were unable to get our computer programme to print the Certificates. Thank you Karin. Our thanks also to all those members who helped with the set up and organisation on the day. I especially thank Peter Horsburgh for organising and co-coordinating the wonderful afternoon tea which was enjoyed by all.

I would remind all members that your 2007 / 2008 Membership Fees are due on 1st September and to be able to vote at our Annual General Meeting on Wednesday 3rd October for the Election of Officers you must be a paid up financial member. If you would like to have more say in the running of your Club, I encourage you to nominate for one of the positions on the Executive Committee which will be vacated for election at the A.G.M. Nomination forms will be available from the office.

I look forward to meeting and speaking to you around the Club.

Vital Member Update: On good authority from Joe Semenow, "Rocking Horse Production Will Not Be Affected by Equine Influenza!!"

As we emerge from the recent "Be In It" competition, it was very inspiring to notice the impressive display of 9 rocking horses at the clubrooms. three of which were produced by the Friday night rocking horse group for raffling by the club. The rocking horse group had an embryonic start in 1991 under the leadership of Alf Stephens, who carved a Bolted Bow Rocker (a toe cruncher that provided a number of learnings as all pioneering projects do). In the following



year a new model was introduced and it remains the basis of the current rocking horses.

Since this period of time some 50+ horses have been hand carved and crafted by the group to be raffled for various fund raising and community projects. More than double this number have also been produced by club members privately (I feel tired just thinking about the collective effort involved). The club horses were raffled by the club at community festivals and donated to causes that the club deemed worthy such as the Angliss Hospital, "Victims of Crime" and Tyler Fishlock – the delightful little "celebrity" boy who lost his sight due to cancer.

We are proud of our extensive networking with other clubs in Victoria as we continue to share our skills and experience. Some five years ago our group welcomed 6 members of the Waverley club, helping them carve their horses with dedication and passion. We were heartened that they took their skills back to their Waverley club where they put them into practice and the club's rocking horse crafting is thriving. The passion for rocking horse crafting has also spread to the Berwick and Eltham clubs, plus a new club forming down Geelong way is apparently progressing well.

The wood hand carving skill is slowly giving way to modern technology (alright, alright....very quickly I must admit) so the club is proud to be able to preserve this skill and pass it on to future generations. There is no better way to continue this tradition than in the construction of a beautiful heirloom rocking horse (that doesn't need feeding, power or any megabyte upgrades.....and certainly won't catch Equine Flu!!!!).

The rocking horse team are proud of their sustained contribution made to the community over the last 15 years and we look forward to continuing that contribution into the future. We are also keen to attract more club members who have an interest in crafting a rocking horse!

It was constructed from the raw pieces of timber that had to be bought and hauled on the tandem trailer from the nearest town (the longest piece for the swing set was 16 feet long.
