

Larger projects by Club members

Here's another project that could not have been made at the Club!

Peter Horsburgh constructed this cubby house for his granddaughter, Abbey, out of recycled wooden pallets to keep the cost down.

It is constructed on a bed of 3 pallets and even the roof is wood.

While the wood was cheap the total cost was way over budget (sounds like the Government doesn't it!) as he installed a lead-light window in the roof on each side and fitted an armour plate glass panel 100cm x 150cm in the rear wall to give light and a view. The whole exterior was coated in marine varnish to protect the timber.

The floor is tiles and there is a fluorescent dado around the interior walls.

But the real expense was in the \$100's to have the completed house transported to their house as he built it under his own carport instead of building it in-situ at their house!!
