

# President's Report - Hurtle Lupton

Your Committee is currently investigating the various methods of filtering the air in both the wood turning and the workshop areas for the collection of the fine dust particles currently not being collected in the most efficient manner by our existing system.

Again the thicknesser has been abused by a Club member. This time timber with some nails was run through the machine causing damage to both the cutters and also the bed resulting in the bed having to have the grooves removed. This is a result of pure carelessness by an irresponsible member.

Unfortunately we have had to place a number of notices on the thicknesser in an attempt to stop the damage to the machine, please take the time to read these notices and follow the advice thereon. This latest damage was caused by a person not checking the timber with the metal detector. If damage continues to occur on this machine it may become necessary to only allow use of the thicknesser under the supervision of the key holder. Your co-operation in this matter will be greatly appreciated.

For some time now we have been very fortunate to have been able to borrow the Knox City Council trailer when it has been necessary to collect donated timber. On some occasions this trailer has not been available and it has become necessary to rely on a member's generosity for the use of their trailer. Of course this is not always been convenient for the member as on many occasions the trailer has had to be emptied before it could be used by the Club.

The following email has been received and is offering a Club member the opportunity of

teaching secondary students basic wood working skills while being paid.

I am writing on behalf of Bayswater Secondary College and wondering whether you can help. A group of Year 10 students from Bayswater SC would like to learn woodworking, however the school currently does not have a woodwork teacher, but does have a fully equipped woodworking room.

They would like to pilot an 8-10 week program, commencing in July, to help skill these young people in wood work. They are seeking assistance in finding a woodwork facilitator (doesn't require qualifications, just a basic skill level and interest in helping young people) for this period of time. The first weekend of March saw the annual **Knox Festival.** As usual the Knox Woodies were well represented on a glorious Autumn weekend.





The Club has purchased a new, 21 inch **Excalibur** scrollsaw for the use of Members.

The saw takes pinless blades only, and some spare ones can be found in the white box under the unit. If you are at all serious a b o u t y o u r

scrollsawing, then you would be wise to purchase your own blades as the Club is only supplying a couple of sizes. Instructions for changing blades, together with a chart of common blade types and sizes, can be found on the laminated card accompanying the machine. Blade tensioning is automatic via the white lever at the front of the blade holder, and the black knob at the rear of the arm **should not be used for blade tensioning as this will damage the saw**. This knob is for setting the arm height only.

There are only a limited number of more sleeps to Christmas (and to the Stringybark Festival), so can all Members endeavor to help out by constructing at least one item for the Christmas appeal, or for sale at the two annual Festivals. One item from each Member would go far in alleviating the load from those few diehards who do the brunt of the work for the Club.

# From the Soapbox

There has been yet another incident of abuse of our Powermatic thicknesser. Some stupid or just bloody-minded person has fed a piece of timber containing at least three **protruding nails** through the machine several times, resulting in deep scoring to the cast iron table, and the chipping of one cutter.



This has resulted in the necessity to grind the table smooth with an oilstone to prevent the raised edges of the grooves from maring other peoples work. This would not have happened if the timber had been scanned with one of the four metal detectors that the Club possesses! I think that the selfish action by this member is totally contemptible. The witness marks on the rear table roller indicate that the nails were actually protruding from the timber through several passes. The member has not used the metal detector and has not even visually inspected the timber before committing what amounts to an act of vandalism on this beautiful piece of machinery. Whoever you are, I hope that you are totally ashamed of your selfish act!

I would like to bring to everyone's attention the need to take care of our work surfaces. Accumulations of glue, paint, etc., can easily ruin the surface of someone's prized project, so please clean up glue spillages while they are still wet, and place newspaper or plastic under glue-ups and when painting, to prevent unnecessary marring of our work-surfaces. The Club has plastic sheeting available for this purpose.

"Out of Order" signs are presenting minor problems. If you observe a fault in a piece of equipment, by all means attach an "Out of Order" sign, but also advise the Keyholder or a member of the Committee what the problem is, and if possible place a note on the machine, advising what the problem is (eg. machine making noise, wobble in blade, headstock loose, etc.). Please, do not remove "Out of Order" signs unless you are authorised to do so.

I believe that a few words need to be said about respect. It is unfortunately a practice of a small minority of Members to be critical and judgmental of others in the Club. The old adage about "not judging me until you've walked a mile in my shoes" is worth applying. I have heard members criticised for "not pulling their weight" or not contributing enough to the Club, Many of our Members suffer ill-health, have debilitating medical conditions, or have significant commitments outside the Club, etc., any of which may prevent high levels of participation in Club projects. Ultimately, this is a Club to which we all **choose** to belong, not a business of which we are employees with a work obligation.

Finally, if you find yourself at loggerheads with another Member, try to see their point of view and exercise tolerance. After all, woodworking for us is a hobby and we are all in it for the enjoyment that it brings to us.
