**** VALE – Paul Aminde ****

Paul passed away peacefully Mar. 31, 2014, aged 85 years.

A reflection on Paul Aminde by Peter Horsburgh.

I first met Paul 20 years ago when we worked on a number of Club Projects and from that initial meeting I soon discovered that Paul was a very meticulous and accurate woodworker which should also be said of everything that Paul did.

As I got to know Paul better, it seemed such a strange coincidence that Paul and I frequented a number of the same places in the City during our more youthful years and we shared lots of memories together.

Paul was born and raised in Richmond and was a keen Tigers fan. He often mentioned in conversations that despite a hard upbringing (like everyone else in those times) he was proud of his father's influence and gave him credit for how a young person should behave and respect others.

His favourite Father's saying was "When you go to a house make sure you wipe your feet and remove your hat before you go inside"



Paul started his working life as an apprentice motor mechanic, however, being a patriotic Aussie he put up his age to get into the Army and was posted to Japan as part of the Occupation Forces. After his war service was finished he completed his apprenticeship and worked in that trade for some 5 years before he decided to start another career with Reckitt and Colman as a sales representative.

It was not long before senior management discovered that he was a natural at the job and more importantly, all the customers loved him. As a result they provided Paul with the opportunity to operate on their behalf in his own van across all Victorian country areas. Paul remained as a representative for a number of years until he decided that he would sell the van and take the family on an overseas holiday.

For years at both the Knox and Stringybark Festivals Paul was the first face of The Woodies, that people encountered when they inquired about 'Kidz Korner' kits, and I have no doubt his personality and gracious manner helped boost our sales.

Apart from his ongoing work in the Club on all types of Projects, Paul was also involved with Colin Stewart and Bill Longden when they visited Amaroo Aged Care Nursing Home in Ferntree Gully each week. Each week they would load up with a wide variety of wooden crafts to ensure that all the patients with vastly different capabilities were kept occupied for the afternoon.

Dick is a fine example of the strong bond that members have with one another whilst going about project or committee work, giving to others, help, advise, suggestions and support, fostering camaraderie and a feeling of worth. That feeling perpetuated through Dick's involvement at KDWC, and whilst he was not well enough to attend the 25th anniversary, we all rallied with John on that day to recollect at the celebration with so many that knew Dick, to recognise his foundation status and contributions.

Dick was well looked after in his recent years, living with family in his own flat at the rear, capable, independent and always ready to give a hand. It was a joy to receive from him, some fine memorabilia in the way of photos that he had retained of the early 1990's at the Club, which truly added to the recent 25th event.

If we could all take a positive from having known Dick, in the way we enjoyed his company, is to set aside the pressures of the day for a moment, lean over to your mates on the other end of the work-bench, and take time out to realise what a great lifestyle we enjoy here with one another, and how important having good 'mates' is all about.

Workshop Notes - "members helping members"

The Polishing Brick - by Phillip Spencer

When I am polishing a large flat surface like a table top I use a common house brick to achieve a high shine.

If I decide that I would like a wax finish to my table top I use a house brick wrapped in carpet to help me, whether I apply the wax to unsealed wood or wax over a few coats of shellac, the brick makes life easier.

It takes a bit of effort to polish a coat of wax to a high shine and with each coat applied, to get that depth and shine that makes a waxed finish look so good is hard work. This is where the brick wrapped in carpet comes in handy. The weight of the brick will provide enough friction to melt the wax and let it work into the grain, And, with the flat surface of the brick, you will get a flat shiny deep finish after a few coats of wax and a bit of elbow grease.

To make a polishing brick is simple, find a suitable common garden variety solid house brick, cut some carpet to the width of the brick and glue it on. Allow for the carpet to wrap around the brick, then wrap your polishing rag around your polishing brick.

After applying a coat of wax and letting it dry, take your polishing brick with your polishing rag wrapped securely around it and rub along the grain. You will still have to use a lot of elbow grease but the polishing brick will make the job a bit easier and will give good streak free results.


Mrs. Smith leaned forward. 'Do you mean they actually chewed on your, uh...equipment?'
